## Time to Weigh in on New Mexico's Wildlife Corridors Action Plan

This year's legislative session was a bust for conservation legislation – none of the bills we highlighted in the last two newsletters made it through the process, and very few other environmental bills did either.

However, a bill that passed three years ago is coming to fruition: the New Mexico Wildlife Corridors Act.

This law was passed in 2019 to begin the process of protecting key wildlife corridors in New Mexico, many of which are severed and fragmented by state highways. Keeping these migratory paths open is more important than ever as climate change alters ecosystems and forces animals to move to find suitable habitat.

The Wildlife Corridors Act directed the New Mexico Departments of Transportation and Game and Fish to collaborate on a plan to identify priority projects to improve wildlife road crossings, with a goal of reducing the risk of vehicle collisions and protecting both people and migrating animals..

The draft Wildlife Corridors Action Plan was released earlier this year. It focuses on preventing vehicle collisions with six species – mule deer, elk, pronghorn, bighorn sheep, black bear, and cougar – although other vulnerable species, including Mexican gray wolves and jaguars, were also considered. Project priority locations range from pronghorn crossings south of Raton to bighorn territory near Questa, the Peloncillo Mountains in the southwestern bootheel to Glorieta pass outside



Santa Fe. The Sandia-Jemez corridor along Highway 550 and I-25 is also addressed. [Read the full plan and list of priority projects here.](#)

Once the plan is approved, the big challenge is funding it. The cost of completing each of these projects – which involve fences, underpasses, and other wildlife crossing infrastructure – ranges from \$17 million to \$50 million. The federal government recently passed the Wildlife Crossings Pilot Program, which will make \$350 million available to fund construction of wildlife crossings, but that is only a small start, and the state will have to put up some funding, too.

The next step is for the public to weigh in on the draft plan. If many New Mexicans speak up in favor of implementing this plan, that will help build momentum for the funding that will be needed to implement it.

New Mexico Wild has a form on their website ([click here](#)) that you can use to submit your comments, but note that they strongly encourage commenters to add your own personalized feedback rather than just submitting the form email they have drafted.

Comments are due by March 12. Please take a few minutes to encourage state officials to prioritize connecting wildlife corridors so that species can safely migrate.

## APRIL 1-3, 2022 SERVICE PROJECT: Ft. Union Ranch

**LOCATION:** Ft. Union Ranch near Watrous, NM

**THE PROJECT:** Join us for AWF’s first camping restoration project of the season, where we will continue our work restoring Higgins Canyon on Fort Union Ranch in partnership with the Hermit’s Peak Watershed Alliance. Our restoration activities are part of a larger, landscape-scale conservation effort that includes the nearby Rio Mora National Wildlife Refuge. During this project, volunteers will hand-build rock restoration structures designed by Bill Zeedyk to help heal a gully created by the old wagon highway to Mora.

**SCHEDULE:** Friday, April 1 – Sunday, April 3

Volunteers do not need to be present for the entire weekend to participate. You are welcome to join us just for the work day Saturday, or camp for just one of the two nights.

**GEAR:** Bring everything you need for a weekend of camping and restoration work, including work gloves, hat, long sleeves, long pants, sturdy boots, and sunscreen. We recommend bringing a change of shoes, and waterproof boots or boots you don’t mind getting wet. Rain gear, layers, warm clothes for the evenings and plenty of water are essential.

**FOOD:** AWF will provide breakfast burritos on Saturday morning and bison or veggie burgers on Saturday evening. Please bring a dish to share for the Saturday potluck dinner, along with your own lunches, Friday dinner, Sunday breakfast, and lots of water!
