Time for Transformation

Last month, the 50th anniversary of Earth Day was supposed to bring massive public demonstrations and protests against ecological destruction. Instead, it brought something quite different: a glimpse of a different way for us to coexist with the natural world.

With large portions of humanity limiting our movements and sheltering in our homes, the air rapidly cleared. Satellite images showed levels of nitrogen dioxide and particulate matter plummeting around the world. People in the Indian state of Punjab, 125 miles from the Himalayas, were able to see the massive mountains from their homes for the first time in 30 years.

Meanwhile, the animals noticed that there was room for them again. Coyotes howled from the middle of San Francisco streets, wild goats took over the town of Llandudno, Wales, and flamingos flocked to Mumbai in numbers three times higher than usual. Everywhere people shared photos of cougars, wild boars, even jaguars walking city streets in the absence of humans.

A simplistic, nihilistic reaction to these images is to conclude that the world is better off without us. A more fertile question to ask is: how can we make the world better off with us?



AWF volunteers know the answer to this question on a small scale. As we go out, year after year, building structures and planting native trees to restore a piece of the landscape, we come away knowing that this one small place is better for our having been here.

The benefit of this moment is that it shows us how this is possible on a global scale. If we rapidly transition off fossil fuels, shift our economy and transportation to renewable electric power, and adjust our activities to leave more space for other species—protecting and creating wildlife corridors, keeping our night skies dark, nurturing urban wildlife habitat throughout our cities, and welcoming species that are sometimes seen as nuisances—we can have this beauty and wonder all the time, not only in the midst of an unprecedented crisis.

The powers that be have long argued that we would never make the necessary changes, because they are too hard and involve too much sacrifice. But look around at the creativity, ingenuity, and generosity flowering in this moment. Everywhere people are sewing masks and donating food and changing their lives to protect the lives of their neighbors.

Lives are at stake beyond this moment—it was only four months ago that half a billion animals perished

in the Australian wildfires that were fueled by climate change. And transforming our society wouldn't just benefit wildlife, but us as well. More people are dying right now of the novel coronavirus in places with higher levels of air pollution.

Tragedies can change our perspective, refocus our priorities, and inspire us to make changes we have long known we need to make. Building a better world on the other side of this pandemic is a way for us to redeem the immense suffering of this moment. We can look out the window now and see what is possible, if we work for it, if we fight for it.

UPDATE ON 2020 VOLUNTEER RESTORATION SERVICE PROJECTS

First the bad news: due to the ongoing public health restrictions, AWF is regretfully postponing the projects we had planned for May 15-17 at Fort Union Ranch and June 5-7 on the Rio San Antonio in the Jemez Mountains.

We are very sorry about this both because we know the restoration work we had planned is urgently needed, and even more so because we miss spending time with all of our wonderful volunteers in the close-knit AWF community.

The good news is that it shouldn't be too much longer before we are able to be together once again. AWF's board is working on new safety protocols so that we can resume our restoration projects as soon as the public health restrictions are lifted, and we are in touch with our partners at Amigos Bravos and the Forest Service about the project we have planned for Midnight Meadows next month.

Moreover, we are planning to reschedule both the Fort Union and Rio San Antonio projects for later this year. We have Fort Union on the calendar for September 18-20, and the new dates for the Rio San Antonio project will be announced soon.

In the meantime, we encourage you to reflect on your memories of AWF projects past, and send us any stories you'd like to share.
