Every Year is an Election Year for the Environment

Next year at this time, New Mexicans will have a chance to vote for major offices that will set the direction of state and national policies on conservation and wildlife management, from every seat in our state legislature to our representatives in Congress the presidency.

But there are important elections for the environment happening this year as well.

In 2018, New Mexico consolidated almost all local elections so that they would be held together on the second Tuesday in November of odd-numbered years. (Prior to that, local elections were scattered across the calendar, from school board races in February to mayoral races in March or October.)

This month, voters have the opportunity to weigh in on offices that include city councilors, who set local policies on open space, water conservation, land use, and wildlife management – such as whether nuisance animals in the city limits are killed or humanely relocated. The election also includes school board members who decide what New Mexico's children will learn about issues like climate change. And it includes some offices that are very specific to the local environment, like Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts are local government agencies that were first established nearly a century ago in response to the Dust Bowl. They have the potential to be key partners in funding and organizing

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land and water conservation projects – depending on who is elected to serve on them.

Finally, along with the candidates, there may also be local bonds or policy questions on your ballot that can impact the environment, such as by providing funding for parks or water conservation.

So we encourage you to visit the state's <u>voter information portal</u>, where you can check out a sample ballot and find your polling places. Once you know what's on your ballot, you can read more about the candidates and issues in helpful voter guides from the League of Women Voters (<u>Albuquerque</u>; <u>Las Cruces</u>; <u>Santa Fe</u>). And then get out to the polls next Tuesday (if not before!) and cast your vote with wildlife and the environment in mind.

The project's main focus will be to remove non-native/invasive plants, especially Ravenna grass. There will also be clean-up of tumbleweeds and litter, and likely some other activities. When the work is done, we will enjoy a picnic lunch. Further details will be provided when you sign up.

In early October, a small group of volunteers returned to Bill Zeedyk's property to complete the rock structures that we were unable to work on in June, as Manuelitas Creek was running exceptionally high in spring and early summer.

Under Bill's guidance, some volunteers extended protective fencing around the wetland vegetation, while others built a pair of one-rock dams in a section of the creek where there had previously been beaver dams. The rock structures were built with native rock and rock brought to the site by Josh Miner from Fort Union Ranch. Volunteers also added material to a beaver dam analog that had been constructed in June and then partially washed out by floods. Although high waters had washed away one side of the structure, what remained had silted in and formed a point bar with Peachleaf willow sprouting from the structure. During the October project, volunteers reconnected that structure with the bank, allowing more water to flow into remnant channels feeding the wetlands.



For our final camping restoration project of the season, AWF returned to the Gutierrez Ranch, which has been in the family of Patrick Gutierrez, our friend from the Hermit's Peak Watershed Alliance, since the 1700s. The ranch includes the upper reaches of Cañon Largo, lower portions of which are publicly accessible in the Sabinoso Wilderness. On the Gutierrez ranch, springs feed an old orchard, and perennial pools provide habitat for small fish, frogs, and turtles.

This year, we were pleased to discover that many of the rock structures we built last June had captured sediment during the 2022 monsoon and were densely vegetated with grasses. We made some repairs to several structures that had partially washed out, and built new one-rock dams, media lunas, and Zuni bowls to hold and spread the water. Several volunteers also put up additional fencing to protect small springs down in the canyon. We were delighted to be joined by several members of T'iis Yazhi Garden Family all the way from Pine Hill, NM (near Ramah), as well as a van full of hardworking students from Highlands University who are studying conservation techniques. Thanks to everyone who came out and joined us, and we hope to see many of you again next year!
