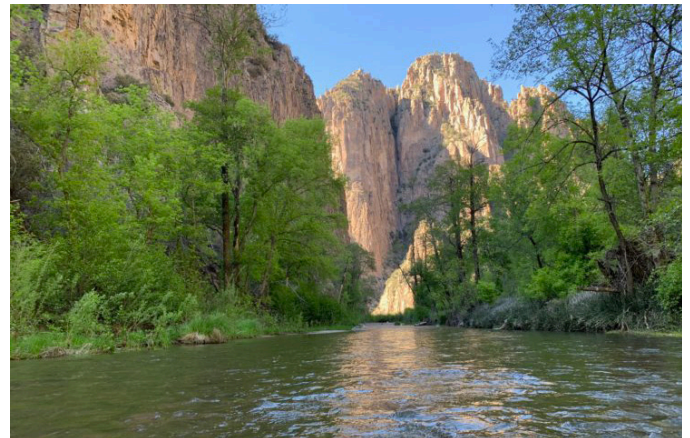
A Chance to Keep the Gila Wild and Free

On May 7, 2020, Senators Tom Udall and Martin Heinrich introduced the M.H. Dutch Salmon Greater Gila Wild and Scenic River Act, which would protect about 440 miles of the Gila and San Francisco rivers.

The fight to save New Mexico's wild Gila River has spanned generations. Since 1946, there have been a series of proposals to dam the river and divert its water to human uses. The most recent serious attempt started about 15 years ago, and the threatened diversion led American Rivers to designate the Gila as the most Endangered River in America last year.

But the Gila River, and those who have dedicated their lives to protecting it (like the late Gila advocate Dutch Salmon), has proven remarkably resilient. It remains the only wild, undammed river in New Mexico – and with its tributaries, it constitutes the largest remaining network of naturally flowing river segments in the Southwestern U.S.

The Gila is rich with life, home to the rare Gila trout and more than 300 species of birds, including the endangered Southwestern Willow Flycatcher, threatened Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Common Black Hawk, Montezuma Quail, and Elf Owl. It is also a haven for people, with outstanding recreational opportunities for fishing, hunting, backpacking, and floating. The Grant County



Commission voted to support a Wild and Scenic designation for the river because it supports such a vibrant outdoor recreation economy.

The Wild and Scenic Rivers Act, passed in 1968 as a sequel to the Wilderness Act, protects designated rivers in their free-flowing state, preventing any new development that substantially alters a river's natural state, like mining, oil and gas drilling, and dams.

Back in 1924, Aldo Leopold convinced the U.S. Forest Service to set aside half a million acres of wild country as the Gila Wilderness, creating the nation's first protected wilderness area. Thanks to his vision, this landscape remains much as it was during Leopold's time.

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (FWS) issued a request for comments on April 15, 2020, beginning a 60-day period for the public to provide input on proposed changes to the Management Rule that guides many aspects of how the FWS fulfills its obligation to recover the Mexican gray wolf to a sustainable wild population.
